

# 3. JORDAN RIVER FOREST LAND TO BECOME REGION'S COMPOSTING SITE?

As of January 2015 the Capital Regional District (CRD) will not accept kitchen scraps at their regional Hartland Road garbage dump located in Saanich. This action will divert an estimated 30,000 tons of garbage, annually, from the landfill and will extend the sites lifetime. The District of Saanich has a 5-year contract with a Vancouver Island composting company to handle their kitchen scraps. Other Greater Victoria municipalities who collect their own garbage, as well as private garbage collectors like Alpine, Sooke Disposal and Emterra need somewhere to dump and recycle their scraps too. To meet this need the CRD has an interim arrangement with a Mainland dump and is trucking kitchen scraps there for \$140 a ton - a \$33 per ton premium over dumping at Hartland.



Aerial view of the 160 acres being considered for a regional composting facility by DL Bins. Highway 14 crosses the property at the bottom left. CRD Regional Park (Sandcut Beach and Jordan River Forest) is the

neighbouring property to the left. Crown TFL land is to the north and east. The area being considered for rezoning is outlined in red and was clear cut by WFP since this satellite image was taken. The access road can be seen on the left as it leaves and re-enters the property and McManus Creek can be seen at the bottom right where it flows into and out of the property.

DL Bins, owners of Fisher Road Recycling of Cobble Hill, the company processing Saanich's kitchen scraps, is looking for a new location to expand their business. They have found a possible composting location between Shirley and Jordan River on land presently owned by Western Forest Products (WFP). David Laing, owner of DL Bins, has arranged a public information session to inform the community of his proposal, answer questions and determine community support:

- Saturday, December 6<sup>th</sup>
- 2:00 pm
- Shirley Community Hall

The proposal is to purchase a 160 acre forested parcel from Western Forest Products and operate a composting facility on 20 acres at the back of the site, leaving the remainder forested. The property is located on the north side of Highway 14 between Sandcut Creek to the east and Desolation Creek to the west. Legal Description: Lot 72 Renfrew District Plan 3388RW (PID 008-694-915). A small portion of the property crosses Highway 14 and abuts Sandcut Beach. The property is zoned AF which allows for forestry and agriculture. The intent is to apply for an Industrial rezoning of 20 acres to accommodate the composting operation. A rezoning application has been submitted to JDF Planning Services.

Access would be from an existing forestry road that passes through CRD land to the west. It is estimated that two tandem trucks a day would bring yard and garden waste, food waste, stumps and land clearing debris to the site. The same trucks would be cleaned and then used to haul away the composted material

#### 5. OTTER POINT FIRE COMMISSION AGM REPORT

The Otter Point Fire Protection and Emergency Response Service Commission held its Annual General Meeting on Tuesday, November 18th. Reelected for another two-year term were commissioners Kenny Jones (Chair), Bud Gibbons (Treasurer) and Joanne Hemphill. Commissioners Marie-Ann Davidson (Secretary), Lloyd Heinemann and Harold Melville have another year remaining in their two-year term. Scott Hemphill remains as the firefighters' representative. The Juan de Fuca Electoral Area (JDFEA) Regional Director sits as an ex officio member of the commission but does not attend meetings unless there is a specific agenda item requiring his participation.

The commission was established by the Capital Regional District (CRD) in 1980 and is the successor to the Otter Fire District Society. The commissioners are responsible to the CRD and the taxpayers of Otter Point for the general operation of the Otter Point Fire Department (OPFD) and appoint the Fire Chief who manages the day-to-day operations of the department. The fire department responds to a range of fire and other emergencies in the community including:

- Motor vehicles accidents, where fire or trapped occupant(s) is a concern
- Hazardous material
- Alarm bells
- Rescue
- Medical assistance
- Open burning complaints
- Mutual aid to other local area fire departments.

**Note:** This year the department was called out to assist the Sooke Fire Department on numerous occasions. The house fire on West Coast Road in Saseenos was the largest because it spread into a forested area. A similar situation in Otter Point involved 5 fire departments and the provincial forestry service and proved how well mutual aid training has benefited our community.

The OPFD also operates the Fire Training Centre located behind the Otter Point Fire Hall. In addition to providing live fire training for the OPFD, the facility provides regional training sessions in conjunction with the BC Justice Institute and is rented to other volunteer fire departments. This is a source of income for the Otter Point Fire Commission.

The OPFD is supported by taxpayers who own property within the Otter Point Fire Protection District boundary. Some property owners in Otter Point choose not to pay for fire protection and are therefore not covered by the OPFD. The

commissioners prepare an annual operating budget, which is approved by the JDFEA Regional Director and the Finance Department of the CRD. The budget for the department's operation in 2013 was \$272,695. The budget for 2014 is \$283,753. This is a 4% increase over 2013. The cost per average household is \$243.43. The cost to individual property owners in Otter Point for fire protection and emergency response services appears as a line item on your provincial tax assessment and for 2014 is \$62.65 per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

The 2014 Otter Point Volunteer Fire Department annual report notes a slight increase in the volume of call-outs from 2013 with a year-to-year increase from 126 to 130. Again, the most notable statistic was the number of First Response incidents, which have gone from 40 in 2010 to 64 this year. They now account for over half of the fire department's total requests for service. First Response incidents are generated by 911 calls to the BC Ambulance Service who then request that the fire department also attend. The firefighter man-hours for all incidents this past year totaled 855.

**Note:** Some calls were categorized differently in 2014. Mutual Aid calls were not counted separately. Hydro calls are when a line is down and the OPFD responds to provide public safety until the Hydro crew arrives.

#### 6. OTTER POINT EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT UPDATE

The following was submitted to the OPSRRA newsletter by Al Wickheim - Otter Point Community Coordinator, Juan de Fuca Emergency Management Program

#### Hello neighbours:

Here is a brief update on some of the items of concern and action around Otter Point relating to Community based Emergency Management and Response. One area in which significant progress is being made is Communications. We had great support from Emergency Measures BC (EMBC) for enhanced communications to the 'outside' in the event of a large-scale isolating disaster and we are developing a very workable 'internal' radio network between Pods (neighbourhoods) as well as to our good neighbours to the West in Shirley.

The potential for an isolating event affecting Vancouver Island is real. Our ability to act in response in a way that enhances survival and recovery as individuals and communities is equal to the task. There is no guessing what may happen - the permutations are too numerous but a response and recovery plan geared towards full reinstatement of services, housing and the economy has a defined end-point to work towards. In the initial stages of any major event warnings, response and action will be the key factors. When the Event passes after minutes to weeks - this is where connections and recovery efforts must begin. Communication throughout this period will be critical. Except for a few, most of us will be here. Our carpenters, teachers, nurses and mechanics, cooks and hospitality agents will all be needed. None will be coming from elsewhere. Communications around the district will aid greatly in getting the mechanic to the broken generator and the carpenter to the leaking roof or unstable walls and animals to shelter and safety. We have been very active in developing and mapping the effective communication routes around Otter Point and establishing relays along the entire coast line and on to Shirley. We have much of the Kemp Lake Valley and West Slopes above Gordon's Beach covered as well. However, there are gaps to be filled and Pods still needing Captains and volunteers of all sorts.

On another front we have been working with 'Highways' and made progress in addressing several road-related concerns. The 'ditch that would not drain' immediately to the east of Tugwell Creek is to be remedied and the sloughing embankment scaled back. It has over the years slumped into the ditch, routing the water away from Tugwell and pooling along West Coast Rd. As well, the Evacuation Route up the western end of Otter Point Place, which we rebuilt last year and was then closed (?) by a series of concrete barriers, has been re-opened by way of brush removal allowing pedestrian and cycle traffic through. It is to no one's advantage to either have this, or other, vital routes unusable, nor for them to

be misused by unlicensed ATV's and renegade motorcyclists or those inclined to deposit their garbage and burnables for free. Easily identified and passable Evacuation Routes are as critical to the community as a smoke alarm is to your home. Better signage and more established routes for pedestrian evacuations have been identified and are being prepared as time allows.

An "All Hazards" map for Otter Point is being developed and will be posted online in the not-too-distant future. And on recruiting, we now have 17 Pod Captains, up from just a few a couple of years ago. Anyone out there who had been involved, or tried, in years past I warmly invite you to contact me. Our Otter Point program is leading the way in innovation, engagement of the community and the development of a very workable system that if not used by us can be carried on through the future. One thing is for sure, someday; something big and bad is going to happen here. Events such as these happen all over the world. Awareness and preparation are a couple of things you probably will be glad you had attended to before a disaster, rather than wishing you had after the fact.

#### 7. JDF COMMUNITY LAND TRUST CONTINUES TO FUNDRAISE

The following was submitted to the OPSRRA newsletter by Arnie Campbell – Treasurer for the JDF Community Land Trust Society

Recall the expression "A dollar short and a day late"? It usually refers to someone being unprepared, missing an opportunity or an action being poorly timed. When the Juan de Fuca Community Land Trust Society recently missed the opportunity to make an offer on the 70 acre Admiral's Forest, in Otter Point, we were certainly a day late but not a dollar short. Immediately after the property was listed for sale a community-minded "silent partner" offered to help us make an offer that met the asking price and would have kept the forest as a community park. We were too late, though, as the trustees for the estate had already accepted an offer from a member

of the Admiral's family. Access to the forest is now prohibited, logging is underway and an opportunity to preserve the property for community recreation and wildlife habitat has been lost.

The JDF Community Land Trust learned a lot from this experience; most importantly that we need immediate access to cash if we intend to buy property. We have some, but not enough to begin serious discussions about a couple of other suitable properties in our area. So why even bother? Well, it takes at least 50 years to make a forest and no one seems to be very interested in waiting that long for a return on their investment when other more profitable uses are at hand. Without exaggeration, over 1,000 acres of forest in Shirley and Otter Point has been replaced with housing or other use in the past decade. Only ½ of one percent of Otter Point is identified as public park land and none of it true forest.

#### 8. CHANGES COMING FOR SHORELINE DEVELOPMENT IN JDFEA?

Rising sea levels and risk from a tsunami are a concern. A recently released Capital Regional District (CRD) report estimates that across the CRD there are approximately 3,700 Hectares of land comprising 18,000 properties and 19,000 dwelling that could fall below the province's proposed Year 2100 Flood Construction Level (FCL). Within the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area there are an estimated 1,300 Hectares consisting of 1,100 properties and 860 dwellings (with an estimated BC Assessment value of \$100,000,000) that could be affected by a change in the FCL.

Last month's newsletter looked at proposed provincial Flood Plan Hazard guidelines and the CRD's response to projected sea level rises of about half a metre over the next 35 years and a full metre by Year 2100. The province wants municipalities and regional districts across the province to:

Increase shoreline development setbacks.

- Determine new design requirements for buildings, subdivisions and zoning in identified flood hazard areas along our coast in response to rising sea levels.
- Minimize property damage from a tsunami.

Gradual sea rise and tsunamis are two very different actions of nature. If sea rise happens it will be slow, uneven and will have different consequences for different developed areas along the coast. Factors such as elevation above sea level, dykes, proximity to tidal rivers, storm surge and areas of known beach erosion will likely determine where the water goes (or not).

A tsunami is different; it's a sudden, massive movement of water caused by an earthquake. Depending on the strength of the earthquake, its distance away and the contours of the shoreline and ocean floor, the tsunami's arrival can be immediate (or not) and damage can range from little to total shoreline destruction and loss of life. If there is enough warning an area in danger of a tsunami can be evacuated. If a tsunami is mild, the damage may be moderate and probably repairable. Preparing for the "Big One" is the problem and that is what the province is directing local governments to undertake. However, the solutions proposed by the provincial government could be an even bigger problem for someone who lives along our coastline.

One proposal is to increase the setback for waterfront properties in higher tsunami risk areas, such as the Strait of Juan de Fuca using the following provincial guidelines:

- A subdivision application in tsunami prone areas must include a report by a suitably qualified professional who must formulate safe building conditions for each proposed lot based upon a review of recent Tsunami literature plus the historical report, "Evaluation of Tsunami Levels Along the B.C. Coast", by Seaconsult Marine Research Ltd., dated March 1988.
- At a minimum, building conditions should protect improvements from damage from a tsunami of equal magnitude to the March 28, 1964 tsunami that resulted from the Prince William Sound, Alaska earthquake.
- Setback requirements should establish on a site-specific basis and take into account tsunami hazards.
- The setback must be sufficient to protect buildings and must be at least 30 metres from the Year 2100 estimated natural boundary.

Both the CRD and the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area regional director have serious concerns about the financial, legal and social impact of the guidelines on coastal communities such as Jordan River, Shirley and Otter Point.

The CRD wrote: "There is time to consider the risks of flood events, or other events such as tsunamis, on top of a rising sea level for coastal communities." And, "The CRD requests that the Province consider a more comprehensive approach to sea level issue planning over the next few years

in order to consider all potential implications and develop the most appropriate response."

Director Hicks asked the minister to, "... stop the process, re-evaluate the basis for the recommendations and reach out for practical solutions to counter rising sea levels and the threat of a Tsunami."

Other identified problems are: incomplete or missing definitions; determining where the foreshore natural boundary will be as sea levels rise; using floodplain level data to determine setbacks and identifying who will compensate property owners who have to move or whose property loses value. Unless handled correctly the final determiner in this will likely be the property insurance companies, mortgage lenders and the real estate market.

Settlement Area was presented for consideration. Potential for subdivision of Rural A lands in the Rural Zone was discussed, without consensus reached by the Committee. The suggestions will all be presented to the public at the upcoming Open House/Workshop.
