#### 2. JORDAN RIVER: PROPOSED CHANGES TO NO SHOOTING ZONE

OSPRRA has submitted a proposal to change the "No Shooting Boundaries" around the area of Jordan River.

The area has been experiencing various types of recreational shooting close to and around residential areas. This shooting has been a safety concern for the residents and visitors to the area.

A map was sent to the province, showing the proposed changes and many residents and businesses submitted their letters of support to this proposal.

After much debate and conversation, the office of Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource made changes to the proposed map.

The community would like to see the boundary proposal off North Main moved further away from Trailhead Drive. This is where the shooting originated and the current map proposed by the province does not address this concern.

#### 3. REPORT PROBLEM SHOOTING TO RAPP LINE

OPSRRA has been working hard to get the shooting area moved further away from residences in Jordan River in response to serious safety concerns raised by residents and many other users of the area, as referenced in the previous article.

If residents or users of the area continue to experience problem shooting in that or any other area, they should call the provincial RAPP line in order to have the complaints logged for future reference. We see it as a major safety issue but have realized that in order to be taken seriously, complaints and incidences need to be on record with the Conservation Officer Service.

# 4. RCMP GUEST SPEAKER AT SCA MEETING WILL GIVE TIPS ABOUT HOW TO DISCOURAGE THIEVES

The November issue of the OPSRRA newsletter featured a quick article about thieves that had been busy at work in the Otter Point area, and also made their way out to Shirley, Jordan River and beyond, stealing many items from many residences. In response to these recent break ins and the on going need for residents and ratepayers to improve security by adding motion lights, locks to out buildings, etc Staff Sergeant Jeff McArthur of the Sooke RCMP detachment will be speaking at the Shirley Community Associations' January 13<sup>th</sup> meeting which begins at 7:30 pm at the Shirley Hall. OPSRRA members are welcome to attend.

#### 5. YOUR PROPERTY ASSESSMENT & APPEAL DEADLINE

According to the BC Assessment Authority the assessed value of a single-family home in the Capital Regional District (CRD) increase by 5% – 10% last year. Their 2015 assessment of the value of your property will be used by the CRD and the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area to determine your 2016 property taxes. Your property value assessment

was mailed on December 31st. If you don't receive it by January 15th, 2016 call **866-825-8322** or Toll Free: **1-866-825-8322** to request a copy. It will also be available for viewing on the BC Assessment web site: <a href="http://evaluebc.bcassessment.ca/">http://evaluebc.bcassessment.ca/</a> beginning Monday, January 4th.

#### Some statistics:

- The B.C. Assessment Authority is responsible for evaluating all properties in British Columbia. Last year 2,167,451 properties were assessed, province-wide an increase of almost 3% from the previous year.
- In 2015 the Assessment Authority assessed about 148,000 properties in the Capital Regional District (CRD) an increase of 1,200 over 2014.
- Last year, the property valuations used to determine your 2015 assessment ranged from -2% to+3% for residential property assessments and 2% to 6% for commercial assessments.
- This year the property valuations are expected to increase assessments by 5% 10% for single-family homes.
- Overall, the value of all assessed properties in the CRD increased slightly from \$88.8 billion to \$90.5 billion in 2015. Almost \$1.099 billion of the \$90.5 billion was attributable to subdivisions, rezoning and new construction. The remainder came from an increase in the assessed market value of existing real estate.
- There are approximately 148,000 assessed properties in the CRD comprising the 13 incorporated municipalities and three electoral areas (including the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area). It's anticipated they will be valued at over \$92 billion. Updated figures for the CRD's Assessment Roll will be released in early January, 2016.
- Approximately 3/4 of the total value of the CRD's assessments are for residential properties (including single-family dwellings, manufactured homes, apartment buildings, etc.) with an estimated average residential property value of \$492,000. This compares to an estimated average residential property value of \$300,000 in the JDFEA.

The B.C. Assessment Authority's **2016** assessment of your property doesn't reflect its current real estate market worth. Their valuation is a "best guess" of your property's value as of **01 July, 2015** based upon recent and comparable property sales, and other assessments in your neighbourhood. Additional factors may be considered such as your home's age, location, quality of construction, current condition and recent improvements. Their July 1<sup>st</sup> 2015 valuation will be used by the local taxing authorities to determine your **2016 property tax**. If you feel that their valuation is incorrect or you want more information on how they arrived at your property assessment, contact the local B.C. Assessment Authority office. Their contact information is given below.

The Assessment Authority has been concentrating on updating its inventory of rural properties in the CRD and anticipates this inventory update will result in increased assessments for some rural properties. Letters were recently sent to 1,855 property owners across the CRD advising them that their assessment was going to increase by more than the average. This was up from 719 letters in 2014 - a 158% increase.

The BC Assessment Authority has also begun collecting aerial and street front images of properties. This information will be used to assist with the 2016 property reviews and in calculating 2017 property assessments.

As of early January, 2016 the Assessment Authority's website will provide a listing of property assessments and sales to help property owners understand their property's assessed market value in comparison to other properties in their area. #### 6. PROPERTY TAX DEFERRAL OPTION

Did you know that under certain circumstances you can defer paying your property taxes? Across British Columbia 35,722 seniors and disabled property owners and 1,389 families

qualified for the provincial program in 2014. In Greater Victoria about 5,000 homeowners deferred over 700 million in 2014 property taxes. Under the program the province pays the outstanding property tax and currently charges seniors and the disabled .85% annual interest. Families, who qualify, pay 2.85% interest on the deferral. Outstanding taxes are registered as a lien on the property and can be repaid at any time until the sale of the property, at which time the province collects its debt. Eligibility is based upon the following criteria:

- Age 55 or older.
- Provincial eligibility as a disabled person.
- Supporting a child under 18 living at home.
- Paying support for child under 18.
- Supporting your child (or step child) at college or university.
- Supporting a child designated as having a disability.

Dear Sir.

This is to notify you that TimberWest Forest Company will be harvesting the area shown shaded orange on the attached 1:5,000 scale map.

As you can see, portions of the Matterhorn trail will be affected.

The harvesting will be carried out between December 15th, 2015 and June 1st, 2016 and work may be ongoing seven days per week.

Because of the potential dangers associated with active harvesting, we ask that you notify the JdF Community Trails Society that this area is strictly off limits until all harvesting work is complete.

The Prime Contractor responsible for the worksite safety will be blocking access routes through the site to prevent unauthorized entry.
